
ENROLLMENT (K-8)

In the past decade, enrollment has steadily increased from 340 to 477 students. To support the additional students, faculty increased from 31 to 49.

Additions to OLMC Staff:

- Three Instructional Aides in Kindergarten classrooms
- Two Math Specialists
- Three Reading Specialists
- Speech and Language Pathologist/SPED Coordinator
- Counselor/Behavioral Interventionist
- Seven additional Instructional Aides to support students and teachers

RESOURCE TEAM

At Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, we continue to be able to offer a variety of levels of support to each of our students. Within the classroom, our teachers offer students small and whole group instruction so that they are able to reach each child at their current academic level. We also have instructional assistants for grades K-6 who assist with small groups, and targeted practice of math and reading skills. Through benchmark testing that is conducted at the beginning, middle, and end of the school year, we monitor each student's growth and identify students who require a higher level of intervention with one of our specialists. For students who require that additional level of intervention, we are able to offer push in and pull out services with one of our Reading Specialists, Math Specialists, Speech/Language Pathologist Assistant (SLPA), or Behavioral Specialist/Counselor.

This year we welcome back Mrs. Leah Valenzuela and Mrs. Molly Goins as our Reading Specialists, Mrs. Aiyana Arnold as our Behavioral Specialist/Counselor, Ms. Abbey Thornhill as our Speech/Language Assistant (SLPA), and I am returning as the Student Support Coordinator and SLP. We are so excited to be welcoming a new Math Specialist, Ms. Arianna Antone, to our Intervention Team! Ms. Antone will be working with our students by pushing into the classrooms, as well as running small group intervention groups with the students who qualify. We are excited to have her join us! Additionally, Mrs. Goins will be with us a little more often to work with the students who require additional support with reading comprehension.

We are excited to start a new year and can't wait to see our students continue to grow!

ACADEMIC DATA & GROWTH


OLMC's goal is to challenge all students academically, while providing the support they need to succeed. Most students receive the proper level of support from their teachers, but some need additional small group or individual interventions. Others need additional challenges through extra enrichment sessions. It is in pushing through academic challenges that students achieve the most growth.


In addition to grades, OLMC uses a variety of assessments to monitor student achievement and growth. The Star Reading and Star Math Assessments are given three times each year: in August for baseline scores, once in December, and again in May.

The Star Assessment program uses the baseline scores to estimate how much progress the students should achieve during the year. With the hard work of the students, their teachers, and all of the support team put in place at our school, OLMC students consistently perform better than their expected scores.

The Dibels Reading assessment is similarly used for Kindergarteners-4th graders to assess their reading progress. It too provides expected progress for the students. OLMC again outperforms those expectations.

ACADEMIC CURRICULUM

Our Lady of Mt. Carmel follows the Diocese of Phoenix Curriculum Standards. All the specific standards taught per grade level can be accessed at the <u>Diocese of Phoenix's Curriculum</u> Standards Website.

Teachers use a variety of resources to teach these standards, including textbooks, online subscriptions, novels, and teacher created activities and projects. Below are some of the resources that teachers use:

Math

MyMath and Glencoe Math curriculum is built around the Standards for Mathematical Practices. It inspires the students to embrace math through real world applications. The MyMath Curriculum is comprehensive in its content and includes several key features designed to enhance mathematics learning, including interactive learning and real-world applications.

5-8th graders also work within the Building Thinking Classrooms framework that focuses on students' problem solving in groups within a supportive classroom environment.

Language Arts

Superkids:

The Superkids Reading Program is designed to enhance early literacy skills for young children, typically in Kindergarten and 1st grade. It emphasizes phonics, vocabulary, comprehension, and fluency through a systematic, engaging curriculum. SuperKids reinforces Catholic Identity through their Connections which include virtues, values, and other Catholic teachings. Key features of the program include: structured lessons, interactive materials and characters that the students follow from kindergarten to 1st grade.

Journeys:

The Journeys reading program focuses on literacy skills for elementary students. It is an anthology of various genres and encompasses phonics instruction, vocabulary development and writing opportunities, along with comprehension strategies.

A wide variety of novel studies are completed throughout the grades. In grades 5-8, students begin to analyze themes and are taught to write analytical essays about novels and other topics. Writing is developed across the curriculum.



ACADEMIC CURRICULUM

Science

For Science standards, teachers use online textbooks, current articles, Mystery Science, and experiments to help students develop interest, wonder, and curiosity about the study of the universe while recognizing the objective nature of science as created by God. They learn to understand the scientific method along with scientific processes which include organizing data. Students explore how science integrates mathematics, reading, and oral and written communication, which are influenced by religious beliefs.

Science teachers place a strong focus on investigation and experiments to develop this sense of wonder.

Social Studies

Teachers incorporate a variety of materials throughout Kindergarten to eighth grade. The social studies curriculum standards focus on Catholic Identity, History, Geography, Government, and Economics. These standards aim to nurture well-developed values based on Catholic teachings and democratic principles. It develops an awareness of how people throughout history have solved social, economic, and global problems. It fosters moral Catholic leaders who are well versed in contemporary issues and are critical thinkers who make unbiased decisions based on facts.












FINANCIAL UPDATE- SCHOOL

Our Lady of Mt. Carmel Catholic School is proud to be financially independent—one of the few Catholic schools that does not rely on parish subsidies. More than 90% of the school's income comes directly from tuition supported by the Empowerment Scholarship Account (ESA) and School Tuition Organizations (STOs). Additional income is generated through fundraisers, grants, and other generous contributions.

Approximately 85% of our expenses are dedicated to salaries and benefits, ensuring that our faculty and staff are supported in providing the highest quality Catholic education. To be good stewards of the resources entrusted to us, the school conducts regular needs assessments to strategically plan how funds are used for the greatest impact. Larger projects are carefully reviewed and approved by the Pastor and the OLMC Finance Council, then sent out for competitive bids to ensure fiscal responsibility.

Through your generosity, OLMC continues to flourish! We remain committed to being good stewards of every gift entrusted to us, always keeping our mission at the heart of every decision. Thank you for partnering with us in this important work of forming faithful, capable, and compassionate young people who will shine with the light of grace for years to come.



SCHOOL SAFETY AND SECURITY

School safety and security is coordinated between school administration and retired police commander, Hugh White. Since 2007, Mr. White has revised and updated the school's critical incident policies and procedures to enhance the school's overall security posture to conform with industry best practices.

Mr. White trains the school staff annually at the beginning of the school year. The Critical Incident Policy, is also reviewed and revised with school administration. Dr. Shewbridge and Mr. Groseta meet with Mr. White regularly regarding security and safety related issues throughout the school year, addressing concerns as they arise. We are very proud of the many safety and security enhancements made over the last several years, to include both physical security barriers and updated camera systems.

In June 2025, the Tempe Police Department Threat Mitigation Unit, including several School Resource Officers, conducted an on-site walkthrough of the entire school and preschool campus with School and Parish leaders. The detective indicated our overall security posture was "excellent" and made a few recommendations to enhance our already secure campus. Those recommendations were implemented throughout the summer before the beginning of the school year.

In August 2025, Mr. White trained Parish staff, as well as weekend Mass ushers. The parish training is in accordance with Fr. Robert's vision that the parish and school operate as one team to ensure safety and security throughout the entire OLMC campus.

Some notable security enhancements this year include the deployment of two-way radios for key staff to communicate quickly with each other during an emergency situation, a scheduled school lockdown drill, and security volunteers at school mass. The safety and security of our school and parish remain the top priority for our school and parish leaders.



EXTRACURRICULAR ACTIVITIES

OLMC school is a vibrant and active community with many clubs available to our students.

<u>Catholic Youth Athletics</u>- 5th-8th grade boys can play Flag Football, Basketball, Baseball, Track & Soccer. 5th-8th grade girls can play Volleyball, Softball, Basketball, Cross Country & Soccer.

<u>Little Flowers & Little Women</u>- K-3rd & 4th-5th grade girls learn virtues through scripture, saints' biographies, the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and fun crafts and projects.

Young Men for Christ- 1st-8th grade young men work to enhance and develop their relationship with Christ and incorporate God's spiritual works on Earth through Fellowship, Prayer, Reflection, and Adoration.

<u>Choir</u>- 2nd-8th-grade students develop their singing abilities and sing at school and some Sunday Masses.

<u>Chess Club</u>- Kindergarten-8th graders learn and play chess! We partner with Chess Emporium to give students the opportunity to learn chess and improve their skills.

<u>Spanish Art Club</u>- 3rd-5th grade students develop their art skills with a little Spanish sprinkled in with professional artist and OLMC Spanish teacher.

<u>Craft Club</u>- 5th-8th grade students create fun crafts including jewelry, canvas art, hand lettering, flower crafts, and sewing.

<u>Catholic Academic Jr. High Decathlon</u>- 6th-8th grade students compete against other Catholic schools' teams knowledge of Roman Catholic doctrine, English, Literature, Science, Mathematics, Current Events, Social Studies, and Fine Arts (Art and Music).

<u>Math Club</u>- 6th-8th grade students expand their math skills and participate in math competitions against other schools.

<u>Battle of the Books</u>- 5th& 6th grade students participate in reading competitions where they work in teams to read books and answer comprehension questions.

<u>Guitar Club</u>- 4th-8th grade students learn the basics of guitar. There is a beginner and intermediate class.

<u>Running Club</u>- 1st-8th grade students run once a week during their lunch recess and can run in various fun runs and races around the Valley.

<u>Scouts</u>- Boy Scouts, Cub Scouts, & Girl Scouts-Kindergarten-5th grade students join OLMC Scout packs and foster character building, citizenship training, and teamwork through safe and familyoriented programs.

Student Leadership- Student leadership opportunities help develop our junior high students into well-rounded, faith-filled leaders who help promote school pride and build community at OLMC. All 7th and 8th graders are eligible to participate in these opportunities by completing the Junior High Leadership Application.

<u>Orchestra</u>- OLMC partners with TOPNA to teach orchestra to 2nd-8th grade students. Students learn high-quality classical music with professional instructors.

<u>OLMC Cheer-</u> 2nd -8th grade cheer club meets once a week and performs at one home game a season.

<u>Speech & Debate</u>- For 5th–8th grade students who want to boost their confidence, sharpen their speaking skills, and have fun with friends!

<u>Imprints of Honor</u>- Imprints of Honor is an afterschool Jr. High program where students honor veterans by conducting interviews and preserving their stories. Students will research, write about, and document the veterans they interview.

<u>Junior Engineering</u>- 7th-8th grade students receive an introduction to electrical, Ohm's law, electrical meters, solar panels, wiring and setup, hands-on labs with actual electrical control and components.

AFTER SCHOOL CLUB SPOTLIGHT

SPANISH ART CLUB

The Spanish Art Club invites students to explore the beauty of the Spanish language, culture, and Catholic faith through creativity and expression. Meetings combine hands-on art projects, guided opportunities to practice Spanish vocabulary and conversation.

Students learn artistic techniques but also deepen their appreciation of art. This year, students' final project was proudly installed in the school front office, allowing the entire school community to enjoy and be inspired by their work.

This club is open to 3rd-5th grade students—whether studnets are new to Spanish or fluent, a budding artist or simply curious. Together, we will grow in creativity, language, and faith while discovering how art and words can inspire a closer relationship with God.


